On 15 August 2025, the Supreme Court of Queensland granted an injunction preventing the City of Moreton Bay from removing 11 residents currently experiencing homelessness from their camp at Goodfellows Road, Kallangur, until a full hearing in December. The case, led by Basic Rights Queensland, argues that the Council's actions may have breached the Human Rights Act 2019 (Qld) by failing to properly consider the applicants' rights to housing and dignity (Basic Rights Queensland, 2025).

Justice Smith found the applicants had a prima facie case, and that the balance of convenience favoured allowing them to remain. The Council, while complying with the decision, expressed disappointment and reiterated its investment in homelessness responses, including the \$3.7 million Peninsula Support Hub, mobile sleep services and pet foster care programs (City of Moreton Bay, 2025).

This case reflects growing legal recognition of housing as a human right, following the ACT's recent amendment to its Human Rights Act. As Commissioner Dr Penelope Mathew stated, "Adequate housing is about more than just shelter. It is the right to live somewhere in security, peace and dignity" (ACT Human Rights Commission, 2025).

The urgency of this recognition is needed following the recent data from 9 Brisbane homelessness services, which make up the Brisbane Zero collaboration. CEO Karyn Walsh said that the collaboration has supported 2125 children and 1230 families, a 48 per cent increase in the number of children supported over the past financial year, half of whom are under four years old, highlighting the deepening crisis driven by housing unaffordability and its disproportionate impact on single-parent families (Lavelle & Murray 2025).

LOCALLY

Service Coordination

Sunshine Coast Zero launched its Rough Sleeper Service Coordination meetings in September, co-facilitated by Taylor Grills from Community Solutions. The first meeting brought together 32 stakeholders and focused on service coordination training, including expectations, guidelines, and coordinated actions for three individuals.

The second meeting in October, attended by 25 stakeholders, explored who the most effective participants are to have in the room. So far, coordination efforts have supported eight individuals from the By-Name List, resulting in 17 actions completed and two people successfully housed, a significant milestone!

Gympie Zero kicked off its Rough Sleeper Service Coordination meetings in October. The first session focused on training and establishing guidelines, with 19 stakeholders participating. Services were coordinated for three individuals, with five actionable steps identified to support their housing journey.

RESEARCH & EVIDENCE-BASED Outcomes

AtoZ, developed by AAEH, won the Bronze World Habitat Award (2025) with UN-Habitat for its innovative, data-driven, community-led approach to ending homelessness in Australia (World Habitat 2025). The model, which SC and WB Zero use, equips communities with realtime, by-name data and cross-sector support to drive systemic change.

Since 2018, AtoZ has expanded to 29 communities and helped over 4,000 people into permanent housing. Geraldton Zero, WA, backboned by Centacare with 30 organisational members, notably ended rough sleeping for people aged 55+ in 2023 proving homelessness is solvable with the right tools, collaboration and State investment (Department of Communities 2024).

In Brisbane, the Advance to Zero initiative reduced average homelessness duration from 7.7 years (2013) to 4.6 years (2022), a 40% drop, through coordinated responses using real-time data (Built for Zero, 2023).

Inspired by this success, the Sunshine Coast and Wide Bay Zero campaign adapts the nationally endorsed methodology to local needs, aligning with the global Built for Zero movement led by Community Solutions and the Australian Advance to Zero led by the Australian Alliance to End Homelessness (AAEH 2025).

The World Habitat Award jury highlighted the adaptability and effectiveness of AtoZ's approach, stating:

"AtoZ shows it's possible to adapt a great methodology for eradicating homelessness to a new context. It proves that communities are best placed to drive local, incremental solutions to end homelessness—they just need the tools to build effective data-driven approaches and the right support from government." David Ireland, Director of World Habitat.

RESEARCH & EVIDENCE-BASED

Outcomes

This international endorsement lends significant weight to local implementation efforts on the Sunshine Coast and Wide Bay. It provides both credibility and momentum as IFYS and community partners engage in building the foundations for a real-time By-Name List, coordinated housing strategies, and stakeholder integration, critical steps to achieving Functional Zero Homelessness in the region. As AAEH CEO David Pearson noted:



"This global recognition shines
a spotlight on communities doing
the hard work. It reinforces the fact
that homelessness can be ended in
Australia—and that communities like
ours are leading the way."

AUSTRALIAN HOMELESSNESS Vulnerability TRIAGE TOOL



Led by Dr Elizabeth-Rose Ahearn, researchers at The University of Queensland conducted a validation study of AVHTT. This study drew on and triangulated multiple data sources, including quantitative administrative data on outcomes, and qualitative data to examine how people experiencing homelessness understood and responded to the AVHTT questions. In addition, the study included observations of the dynamic between workers and service users in the administering of AVHTT in practice. The broader study led to a refinement of the AVHTT tool. The validation study is part of a continuous improvement process, where data will be collected and analysed to identify impacts and future potential for changes based on learnings from the field. AUSTRALIAN INSTITUTE OF HEALTH AND WELFARE

A sobering new report from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW) reveals the devastating reality faced by people experiencing homelessness. Overdose and suicide were the most common causes of death among those who accessed homelessness services in the final year of their lives. **The median age of death was just 55 (AIHW, 2025). In 2022–23, more than half of these deaths were potentially preventable, a heartbreaking average of nine lives lost every day.** These figures

represent more than statistics; they are people whose lives ended far too soon. The findings underscore a critical truth: homelessness is not only a housing issue, it's a public health crisis. Pead more.

WHAT IS ADVANCE TO ZERO?

Advance to Zero (AtoZ) is a national initiative of the Australian Alliance to End Homelessness (AAEH) that supports local collaborative efforts to end homelessness, starting with rough sleeping – one community at a time. Using a range of proven approaches from around the world, communities are supported not just to address individual instances of homelessness, or even reduce overall homelessness, but to end it altogether.

Sunshine Coast and **Wide Bay Zero** is dedicated to support those currently sleeping rough and as a community call for these evidence-based solutions:

- On the ground support including increased Specialist Homeless Services Outreach and Health Outreach while increasing standards of living including 24/7 toilets, hot showers, clean water and working cooking facilities.
- Dedicated Day Hubs otherwise known as Engagement Centres with all the amenities, food and emergency relief, lockers for safe storage, a range services with an emphasis on primary health care and specialist homelessness services.
- Increase in social and community housing including purpose-built supportive housing such as a Common Ground.

SUNSHINE COAST COUNCIL

As of August, Sunshine Coast Council has convened the regional Nambour Homelessness Response Forum bringing together council, Department of Housing and Public Works, and key sector partners in a genuinely collaborative effort to address the growing homelessness issue in the community. The forum is focused on identifying how all government organisations can work in partnership to help those experiencing homelessness and sleeping rough in public spaces and manage associated impacts on community safety and amenity. There has been commitment to explore short, medium and long-term solutions and hold regular Forums to ensure effective partnership and momentum.

SUNSHINE COAST COUNCIL poace

The Community Working Group, established under council facilitation, includes members with lived experience, Chamber of Commerce, Councillors, Community Organisations and council officers. The group has been workshopping potential solutions to provide feedback to the Forum. Mayor Natoli shared these outcomes from the initial Forum;



- The State Government will double mobile outreach visits in Nambour.
- Council will establish a working group to codesign solutions with community partners and those with lived experience. We are searching for alternative locations as a short-term solution.
- A supportive housing model for the Sunshine
 Coast is now a priority for a long-term solution.

We are listening to our community and working across all levels of government to deliver immediate, medium and long-term solutions.

With homelessness not only a city issue, evidence based, Housing First models are needed in regional

local government areas like the Sunshine Coast. Many people sleeping in public spaces have experienced complex trauma and would benefit from supportive housing models, similar, to **Brisbane Common Ground.**

During Homelessness Week in August, Sunshine Coast Council partnered with **Street Up** to provide opportunities for council staff to learn, connect and understand the causes and impacts of homelessness as well as solutions. The experiences shared by the Street Up Lived Experience Leaders were moving and inspiring. Council encourages and supports integrating lived experience into policy and program design at council as well as more broadly in the community, business, government sectors.
